We are a wholly volunteer, not-for-profit, organisation. Our mission is to rescue abandoned dogs from death row at pounds and put them into foster homes until we find permanent homes for them. All money which we raise is used entirely to pay for the costs involved in the rescue and care of dogs.

Our History...

Dog Rescue Newcastle was officially established in May 2008. Before that time we were helping dogs in need, but not under the official banner of Dog Rescue Newcastle.

Sue is one of the co-founders of DRN, and spend many, many hours each week making sure that our dogs foster carers get whatever they need. Their phones never stop ringing. Sue has decades of experience in dog rescue.

Because of the limited number of foster carers, space and time, when the group first formed we concentrated our efforts on small dogs. As the number of carers increased and the demand for medium and bigger dogs became obvious, we now take almost any type of dog, as long as we have a carer available.

We are affiliated with Cat Rescue Newcastle which rescues and rehomes cats and kittens on death row.

Since formation, Dog Rescue Newcastle has re-homed more than 2,000 dogs and over 100 cats that would otherwise now be dead. We always welcome more volunteers into our small, friendly group.

We gave Elly a second chance.
Elly was a tiny Shih Tzu rescued from the pound. Her vet check revealed that she needed surgery to repair a loose kneecap on one leg. She was a very timid and scared due to the pain that she had been enduring all of her life.



After the operation she started to wag her tail like crazy and over time learned to trust people more. Elly made a great physical recovery and without our help she would not have made it. She was eventually adopted by a family which nurtured her into a very playful and loving young dog.

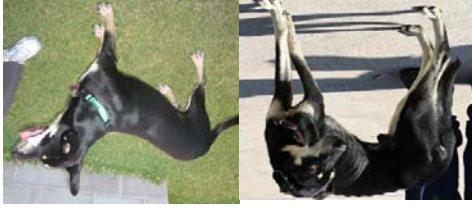


Where Our Dogs & Cats Came From...

Our priority is to save as many dogs and cats as we can from "Death Row" in local pounds. These are the ones with the most desperate need. They have only days, sometimes hours to live.

We rescue dogs from Port Stephens Pound, Wyong Pound, Singleton Pound, Muswellbrook Pound, and beyond. The RSPCA at Ruthersford, which is used by Newcastle, Lake Macquarie, Maitland and Cessnock councils instead of having their own pounds, will not release animals to rescue organisations.

Dogs and cats in pounds are perfectly healthy, normal family pets. They have become lost and remain unclaimed, or are surrendered by owners who can no longer care for them. Very occasionally we find a pet who has suffered from neglect, such as Victor, below. We regret that our resources do not allow us to take private surrenders of dogs and cats.



Victor was close to death from starvation. His dedicated foster carer nursed him back to health and now he is very happy in his forever home.
